County Administrator Review

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation, under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

ORDER

- 1. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to maintain order and decorum at meetings. The Chairman shall speak to points of order in preference to all other members.
- 2. In maintaining decorum and propriety of conduct, the Chairman shall not be challenged and no debate shall be allowed until after the Chairman declares that order has been restored. In the event the Board wishes to debate the matter of the disorder or the bringing of order; the regular business may be suspended by vote of the Board to discuss the matter.
- 3. No member or citizen shall be allowed to use abusive language, excessive noise, or in any way incite persons to use such tactics. The Chairman and/or the County Administrator shall be the judge of such breaches, however, the Board may vote to overrule both.
- 4. When a person engages in such breaches, the Chairman shall order the person's removal from the building, or may order the person to stand silent, or may, if necessary, order the person removed from the County property.

PUBLIC HEARING RULES OF PROCEDURE

1. PURPOSE

- The purpose of a public hearing is to receive testimony from the public on certain resolutions, ordinances or amendments prior to taking action.
- A hearing is not a dialogue or debate. Its express purpose is to receive additional facts, comments and opinion on subject items.

2. SPEAKERS

- Speakers should approach the lectern so they may be visible and audible to the Board.
- Each speaker should clearly state his/her name and address.
- All comments should be directed to the Board.
- All questions should be directed to the Chairman. Members of the Board are not expected to respond to questions, and response to questions shall be made at the Chairman's discretion.
- Speakers are encouraged to contact staff regarding unresolved concerns or to receive additional information.
- Speakers with questions are encouraged to call County staff prior to the public hearing.
- Speakers should be brief and avoid repetition of previously presented comments.

3. ACTION

- At the conclusion of the public hearing on each item, the Chairman will close the public hearing.
- The Board will proceed with its deliberation and will act on or formally postpone action on such item prior to proceeding to other agenda items.
- Further public comment after the public hearing has been closed generally will not be permitted.

Strategic Initiative A -- SERVICE DELIVERY

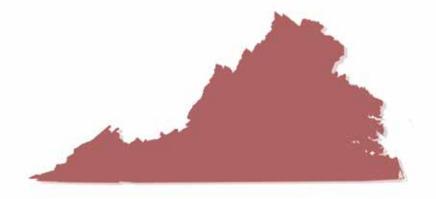
Strategic Initiative E -- FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP AND EFFICIENCY

TOP LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

State Budget and Funding Obligations

PRIORITY: The Planning District localities urge the governor and legislature to enhance state aid to localities, and to not impose mandates on or shift costs for state programs to localities.

While state general fund revenues are expected to continue their upward crawl in the current fiscal year. Development of the next state biennial budget will be challenged by several factors, including the following: 1) the re-benchmarking of public education costs (likely to be over one-half billion dollars); 2) increases in Medicaid costs, which have jumped by over 6% per year since 2010; 3) more pressure on Children's Services Act funding; and 4) replacement of some one-time "fixes" in the current budget plan.

We encourage the State to develop revenue and spending priorities that support K-12 education, economic development, public safety, and other public goals. Localities continue to be the state's go-to service provider, despite local budgets being subject to slowly-recovering local and state dollars. State investment in local service delivery must be enhanced, as many mandated programs have been level funded since 2009. Funding levels for others, such as the Children's Services Act and HB 599, are less than the 2009 amounts.

We take the following positions:

- →We oppose unfunded state and federal mandates and the cost shifting that occurs when the state or federal government fails to fund requirements or reduces or eliminates funding for programs. Doing so strains local ability to craft effective and efficient budgets to deliver services mandated by the State or federal government or demanded by residents.
- →We urge the State to resist placing additional administrative burdens on local governments without sufficient resources or flexibility; otherwise, the quality of services delivered at the local level is jeopardized.
- →We urge policymakers to preserve existing funding formulas rather than altering them in order to save the State money and/or to shift costs to localities.
 - →The State should not confiscate or redirect local general fund dollars to the state treasury.

Public Education Funding

PRIORITY: The Planning District localities urge the State to fully fund its share of the realistic costs of the Standards of Quality (SOQ) without making policy changes that reduce funding or shift funding responsibility to localities.

The State will spend just over \$6 billion on direct aid to public education in FY18. While we appreciate additional state teacher salary dollars this past year, we believe that the State should significantly increase its commitment to K-12 education. In the past decade, overall state funding has increased just seven percent, and while the state-funded per pupil amount has jumped back above the FY09 level, state dollars do not reflect the true costs of K-12 education. Local governments consistently go "above and beyond" to close the funding gap by appropriating twice as much K-12 funding as required by the state.

We believe localities need an adequately defined SOQ that closes the gap between what school divisions are actually providing and what the state currently funds in the SOQ. This could include recognizing additional instructional positions and, as recommended by the Board of Education, increasing state-funded staffing ratios for various, non-instructional positions. This would be a welcome change of

course, as state policies that have been revised since the Great Recession have reduced the state's funding obligations to public education.

Local Revenue Authority

PRIORITY: The Planning District localities urge the governor and legislature to diversify the revenue options available to localities, to include equalizing the revenue-raising authority of counties with that of cities, and to not restrict local revenue-raising authority.

We support the legislature making additional revenue options available to diversify the local revenue stream, which could reduce dependency on real property taxes, rather than removing or restricting local revenue authorities. One way to do this is to eliminate the differences between city and county taxing authority, which exist due to now less-prevalent distinctions in the services provided. This would mean removing the restrictions that currently apply to county authority to levy the meals, lodging, cigarette and amusement taxes. Equalizing revenue authority for counties with that of cities also should be included as part of a needed modernization of the state's tax system to comport with the realities of a global, information-driven economy, which will rely less on governmental spending and more on new, private sector business models. We also believe any tax reform efforts should examine the financing and delivering of state services at the local level.

We take the following positions:

- →The State should refrain from establishing local tax policy at the state level and allow local governments determine the equity of local taxation policy.
- →The State should not expect local governments to pay for new funding requirements or the expansion of existing ones on locally-delivered services, without a commensurate increase in state financial assistance or new local taxing authority (see above).
 - →The State should not alter or eliminate the BPOL and Machinery and Tools taxes.
- →The State should support the appropriate collection of transient occupancy taxes from online transactions.
- →The State should revamp the Communications Sales and Use Tax (CSUT). Revenues from the CSUT coming back to localities are 20% less than 10 years ago, primarily because the tax does not reflect modern technology patterns of consumption. Accordingly, we support 1) leveling the current 5% CSUT with the state sales tax rate of 5.3%; 2) broadening the coverage of the tax to include audio and video streaming and prepaid calling services; and 3) targeting the additional revenues generated to support rural area broadband expansion.

OTHER PRIORITY ITEMS

Broadband

PRIORITY: The Planning District localities encourage and support state and federal efforts and financial incentives that assist localities and their communities in deploying universal, affordable access to broadband technology, particularly in unserved and underserved areas.

Access to broadband, or high-speed internet, is a critical necessity in the 21st century. It has become basic, not optional, infrastructure, just like roads and electricity, that is essential for economic growth, equity in access to public education, community growth, and consumer communications and information. Many communities, particularly those in unserved rural areas, need thoughtful, longer-term strategies to bridge the broadband gap. This may be an approach that utilizes both fiber and wireless technologies, private/public partnerships and regulated markets that provide a choice of service providers and competitive prices.

Accordingly, we believe state and federal support should include the following:

- →Development of a statewide comprehensive plan for broadband and state support for local governments that are developing or implementing local or regional broadband plans;
- →Provisions that provide for sharing utility and road right-of-way easements for expanding broadband;
- →Support for linking broadband efforts for education and public safety to private sector efforts to serve businesses and residences;
 - → Maintaining local land use, permitting, fee and other local authorities;
- →Amending the current 5% Communications Sales and Use Tax to apply to previously uncovered technologies and to mirror the state sales tax rate of 5.3%, and targeting the additional revenues generated to rural area broadband expansion; and
- →Consideration of proposals that would subject broadband to stricter and more developed regulation as a public utility.

Children's Services Act

PRIORITY: The Planning District localities urge the State to be partners in containing costs of the Children's Services Act (CSA) and to better balance CSA responsibilities between the State and local government. The State should resist attempts to shift costs of serving children through CSA to localities and schools.

Since the inception of CSA in the early 1990's, there has been pressure to hold down costs, to cap state costs for serving mandated children, to increase local match levels and to make the program more uniform by attempting to control how localities run their programs.

This past session, the General Assembly appropriated an additional \$85.7 million to address increasing caseloads and costs in CSA, an increase largely attributable to private special education day placement costs. The budget also included language directing a review of options for these placements and how their cost and quality could be better managed. Localities are concerned about proposals that would move CSA "lump sum" funding" to the Department of Education, with any resulting funding shortfalls

becoming the responsibility of localities (rather than the current process where localities request supplemental state funding). Such a scenario could limit services and funding that are necessary for students who may need more intensive services at any time.

Accordingly, we support 1) the ability to use state funds to pay for mandated services provided directly by the locality, specifically for private day placements, where the same services could be offered in schools; and 2) maintaining cost shares on a sum sufficient basis by both the State and local governments. Changing the funding mechanism to a per-pupil basis of state funding would shift the sum sufficient portion fully to localities, which we would oppose.

We also support the following:

- →Enhanced state funding for local CSA administrative costs;
- →A cap on local expenditures (with the State making up any gaps) in order to combat higher costs for serving mandated children; and
- →The State being proactive in making residential facilities and service providers available, especially in rural areas.

Land Use and Growth Management

PRIORITY: The Planning District localities encourage the State to resist preempting or circumventing existing land use authorities, and to provide additional tools to plan and manage growth.

Over the years, the General Assembly has enacted both mandated and optional land use provisions. Some have been helpful, while others have prescribed one-size-fits-all rules that hamper different local approaches to land use planning. Accordingly, we support local authority to plan and regulate land use. We oppose legislation that weakens these key local responsibilities; this would include recent efforts to 1) restrict local oversight of the placement of various telecommunications infrastructure, and 2) single out specific land uses for special treatment without regard to the impact of such uses in particular locations.

We also believe the General Assembly should provide localities with necessary tools to meet important infrastructure needs, as current land use authority often is inadequate to allow local governments to provide for balanced growth in ways that protect and improve quality of life. This would include more workable impact fee authority for facilities other than roads, and changes to the currently-enacted proffer system. Proffer legislation approved in 2016 limits the scope of impacts that may be addressed by proffers, and establishes specific criteria for when a proffer is deemed to be unreasonable. We support changes to the law to provide more balanced and practical standards for determining whether a proffer is reasonable and to restore a climate where localities and applicants can openly discuss rezoning applications.

Further, we support ongoing state and local efforts to coordinate land use and transportation planning, and urge state and local officials to be mindful of various local and regional plans when conducting corridor or transportation planning within a locality or region.

Finally, concerning land preservation, we request state funding and incentives for localities, at their option, to acquire, preserve and maintain open space.

LEGISLATIVE POSITIONS

Economic and Workforce Development

The Planning District's member localities recognize economic development and workforce training as essential to the continued viability of the Commonwealth. We support policies and additional state funding that closely link the goals of economic and workforce development and the state's efforts to streamline and integrate workforce activities and revenue sources. We encourage enhanced coordination with K-12 education to equip the workforce with in-demand skill sets so as to align workforce supply with anticipated employer demands. We also support continuing emphasis on regional cooperation in economic, workforce and tourism development.

Economic Development:

- We support continuation of the *GO Virginia* initiative to grow and diversify the private sector in each region, with ongoing state financial incentives, technical support and other incentives to support collaboration by business, governments, educational institutions and communities that spur economic development, job creation and career readiness.
- We support legislation that dedicates income and sales tax revenues generated by corporations and limited liability companies within an economic development project to such locality in cases where the locality has expended local funds for such project and state grant funds or incentives were not involved.

Planning District Commissions:

- We support increased state funding for regional planning district commissions.
- We encourage opportunities for planning districts to collaborate with state officials and state agencies on regional programs and projects.

Agricultural Products and Enterprises:

We encourage state and local governments to work together and with other entities to identify, to provide incentives for, and to promote local, regional and state agricultural products and rural enterprises, and to encourage opportunities for such products and enterprises through a balanced approach.

Education

The Planning District's member localities believe that the state should be a reliable funding partner with localities by recognizing the operational, personnel, and capital resources necessary for a high-quality public education system (see priority position on *Public Education Funding*).

School Division Finances:

- We believe that unfunded liability associated with the teacher retirement plan should be a shared responsibility of state and local government, with the Virginia Department of Education paying its share of retirement costs directly to VRS in order to facilitate such sharing.
- The State should not eliminate or decrease funding for school employee benefits.
- We support legislation that 1) establishes a mechanism for local appeal to the State of the calculated Local Composite Index (LCI); and 2) amends the LCI formula to recognize the land use taxation value, rather than the true value, of real property.

Literary Fund:

- The State should discontinue seizing dollars from the Literary Fund to help pay for teacher retirement.
- We urge state financial assistance with school construction and renovation needs, including funding for the Literary Loan and interest rate subsidy programs.

Environmental Quality

The Planning District's member localities believe that environmental quality should be funded and promoted through a comprehensive approach, and address air and water quality, solid waste management, land conservation, climate change and land use policies. We support protection and enhancement of the environment and recognize the need to achieve a proper balance between environmental regulation and the socio-economic health of our communities within the constraints of available revenues. Such an approach requires regional cooperation due to the inter-jurisdictional nature of many environmental resources, and adequate state funding to support local and regional efforts.

Chesapeake Bay Preservation Act:

We oppose legislation mandating expansion of the Chesapeake Bay Preservation Act's coverage area. Instead, we urge the State to 1) provide legal, financial and technical support to localities that wish to comply with any of the Act's provisions; 2) allow localities to use other practices to improve water quality; and 3) provide funding for other strategies that address point and non-point source pollution.

Biosolids:

We support the option for localities, as a part of their zoning ordinances, to designate and/or reasonably restrict the land application of biosolids to specific areas within the locality, based on criteria designed to further protect the public safety and welfare of citizens.

Alternate On-Site Sewage Systems:

We support legislative and regulatory action to 1) ensure operation and maintenance of alternative on-site sewage systems in ways that protect public health and the environment, and 2) increase options for localities to secure owner abatement or correction of system deficiencies.

Dam Safety:

We support dam safety regulations that do not impose unreasonable costs on dam owners whose structures meet current safety standards.

Water Supply:

The State should be a partner with localities in water supply development and should work with and assist localities in addressing water supply issues, including investing in regional projects.

Program Administration:

The State should not impose a fee, tax or surcharge on water, sewer, solid waste or other local services to pay for state environmental programs.

General Government

The Planning District's member localities believe that since so many governmental actions take place at the local level, a strong local government system is essential. Local governments must have the freedom, flexibility and tools to carry out their responsibilities.

Internet-based Businesses and Services:

We oppose legislation that would single out internet-based businesses and services for special treatment or exceptions. Rather, the State should support local authority concerning collection and auditing of taxes, licensing and regulation. There should be a level playing field for competition among businesses offering goods and services to ensure safety, reliability and fair access to such offerings by consumers and the general public.

Local Government Operations:

- We oppose intrusive legislation involving purchasing procedures; local government authority to establish hours of work, salaries and working conditions for local employees; matters that can be adopted by resolution or ordinance; procedures for adopting ordinances; and procedures for conducting public meetings.
- We support allowing localities to use alternatives to newspapers for publishing various legal advertisements and public notices.
- We support local flexibility regarding public parking regulation and enforcement.
- We oppose attempts to reduce sovereign immunity protections for localities.

State-Supported Positions:

• Localities should have maximum flexibility in providing compensation increases for state-supported local employees (including school personnel), as local governments provide significant local dollars and additional personnel beyond those funded by the State.

Elections:

As elections administration has become more complex and both federal and state financial support for elections has been decreasing, we urge funding to address coming critical shortfalls in elections administration dollars. We also support state funding for voting equipment replacement, as many older voting machines are exhibiting end-of-life problems.

Freedom of Information Act (FOIA):

- We request that any changes to FOIA preserve 1) a local governing body's ability to meet in closed session, 2) the list of records currently exempt from disclosure, and 3) provisions concerning creation of customized records.
- We support changes to allow local and regional public bodies to conduct electronic meetings as now permitted for state public bodies.

Quality of Life Issues:

- We oppose changes to state law that further weaken a locality's ability to regulate noise or the discharge of firearms.
- We support expanding local authority to regulate smoking in public places.

Health and Human Services

The Planning District's member localities recognize that special attention must be given to developing circumstances under which people, especially the disabled, the poor, the young and the elderly, can achieve their full potential. Transparent state policies and funding for at-risk individuals and families to access appropriate services are critical. The delivery of such services must be a collaborative effort by federal, state and local agencies.

Funding:

• We oppose changes in state funding or policies that increase the local share of costs for human services. We also oppose any shifting of Medicaid matching requirements from the State to localities.

- The State should provide sufficient funding to allow Community Services Boards (CSBs) to meet the challenges of providing a community-based system of care. We believe children with mental health needs should be treated in the mental health system, where CSBs are the point of entry.
- We support increased investment in the ID waiver program for adults and young people and Medicaid reimbursement for children's dental services.
- We support sufficient state funding assistance for older residents, to include companion and in-home services, home-delivered meals and transportation.

Social Services:

- We support the provision of sufficient state funding to match federal dollars for the administration of mandated services within the Department of Social Services, and to meet the staffing standards for local departments to provide services as stipulated in state law.
- We support changes to the Code to provide that a judicial finding be controlling of administrative findings in alleged child abuse and neglect cases.

Prevention:

We support continued operation and enhancement of early intervention and prevention programs. This includes the Virginia Preschool Initiative, Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (infants and toddlers), and federal reauthorization of funding for the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) in order to provide health coverage for vulnerable children.

Childcare:

The legislature should provide full funding to assist low-income working and TANF (and former TANF) families with childcare costs. These dollars help working-class parents pay for supervised daycare facilities and support efforts for families to become self-sufficient.

Housing

The Planning District's member localities believe that every citizen should have an opportunity to afford decent, safe and sanitary housing. The State and localities should work to expand and preserve the supply and improve the quality of affordable housing for the elderly, disabled, and low- and moderate-income households. Regional planning and solutions should be implemented whenever possible.

Affordable Housing:

We support the following: 1) local flexibility in the operation of affordable housing programs and establishment of affordable dwelling unit ordinances; 2) creation of a state housing trust fund; 3) grants and loans to low- or moderate-income persons to aid in purchasing dwellings; and 4) the provision of other funding to encourage affordable housing initiatives.

Homelessness:

We support measures to prevent homelessness and to assist the chronic homeless.

Historic Structures:

We support incentives that encourage rehabilitation and preservation of historic structures.

Public Safety

The Planning District's member localities encourage state financial support, cooperation and assistance for local law enforcement (and state police), emergency medical care, criminal justice activities and fire services responsibilities carried out locally.

Funding:

- We urge the State to make Compensation Board funding a top priority, fully funding local positions that fall under its purview. It should not increase the local share of funding Constitutional offices or divert money away from them, but increase dollars needed for their operation.
- We support returning funding responsibility for the Line of Duty Act (LODA) to the State. In the absence of that, there should be no new or enhanced benefits that increase locality costs.
- We urge state funding of the HB 599 law enforcement program in accordance with *Code of Virginia* provisions.
- The State should increase funding to the Virginia Juvenile Community Crime Control Act program, which has cut in half the number of juvenile justice commitments over the past decade.
- We support funding for mental health and substance abuse services at juvenile detention centers.

Jails:

- As the state prisoner reimbursement rate is insufficient to cover actual costs, the State should restore per diem payments to localities 1) for housing state-responsible prisoners to \$14 per day, and 2) for housing local responsible offenders to \$8 per day. If a state-responsible prisoner is sentenced to serve in jail for more than one year, then the State should compensate the jail for the actual cost of incarceration.
- The State should not shift costs to localities by altering the definition of state-responsible prisoner.
- The State should continue to allow exemptions from the federal prisoner offset.

Offender Programs and Services:

- We support continued state funding of the drug court program and the Offender Reentry and Transition Services (ORTS), Community Corrections and Pretrial Services Acts.
- We support continued state endorsement of the role and authority of pretrial services offices.
- We support authorization for the court to issue restricted driver's licenses to persons denied them because of having outstanding court costs or fees.

Body Cameras:

We support the ability of local governments to adopt policies regarding law enforcement body worn cameras that account for local needs and fiscal realities.

Transportation Funding and Devolution

The Planning District's member localities recognize that revenues for expanding and maintaining all modes of infrastructure are critical for meeting Virginia's well-documented transportation challenges and for keeping pace with growing public needs and expectations. We believe the state should continue to enhance funding for local and regional transportation needs, including the Revenue Sharing Program with localities. We also remain opposed to attempts to transfer responsibility to counties for construction, maintenance or operation of current or new secondary roads.

Transit Capital Funding:

Capital Project Revenue bonds, approved in 2007 to provide \$600 million over 10 years for transit capital, are expiring. Failure by the state to provide replacement funding will jeopardize safe and reliable transit service and will result in the loss of federal funds if they are unable to be matched, which would mean a double hit for transit agencies funded primarily at the local/regional level. Therefore, it is critical that the State identify new funding sources for transit capital investments.

Smart Scale:

• As the State continues to implement the prioritization process established by HB 2 (2014), known as "Smart Scale," and the distribution formula for highway construction projects established by HB 1887 (2015), there should be adequate funding, and local authority to generate transportation dollars, for important local and regional projects.

Devolution:

• We believe that efficient and effective transportation infrastructure, including the secondary road system, is critical to a healthy economy, job creation, a cleaner environment and public safety. Accordingly, we oppose shifting the responsibility for secondary roads to local entities, which could result in vast differences among existing road systems in different localities, potentially placing the state at a competitive economic disadvantage with other states when considering business and job recruitment, and movement of goods.

Local and Regional Authority:

- We support additional authority to establish mechanisms for funding transit in our region.
- We support VDOT utilizing Metropolitan Planning Organizations and regional rural transportation staff to carry out local transportation studies.

Water Quality

The Planning District's member localities support the goal of improved water quality, but as we face ongoing costs for remedies, including stormwater management, we believe major and reliable forms of financial and technical assistance from the federal and state governments is necessary if comprehensive improvement strategies are to be effective.

Funding:

- We urge aggressive state investment in meeting required milestones for reducing Chesapeake Bay pollution to acceptable levels.
- We believe these investments include authority, funding and other resources to achieve success, and must ensure that cost/benefit analyses are conducted of solutions that generate the greatest pollution reductions per dollar spent.
- We support dollars being targeted to stormwater management, for permitted dischargers to upgrade treatment plants and for any retrofitting of developed areas, and to aid farmers with best management practices.

Stormwater Management:

- We request that any stormwater requirements be balanced and flexible, and that adequate funding and training be available for the State and local governments to meet ongoing costs associated with local stormwater programs.
- We support continued investment in the Stormwater Local Assistance Fund to assist localities with muchneeded stormwater projects.
- We will oppose proposals that would result in new or expanded mandates or requirements, including elimination of current "opt-out" provisions, or financial burdens on local governments.
- We oppose further amendments to the regulation of stormwater which would require a locality to waive stormwater charges.

Nutrient Allocations:

• We oppose efforts that would require re-justification of nutrient allocations for existing wastewater treatment facilities in our region or that would reduce or eliminate nutrient allocation or related treatment capacity serving the region.

SUMMARY

The Emergency Management Coordinator (EMC) serves as Head of the County's Office of Emergency Management (OEM). The EMC is responsible for planning, training, response, resource coordination, and other emergency services support activities, both within the county government and in coordination with other local and state agencies. The EMC works under the general day-to-day direction of the County Administrator, who serves as the County's Director of Emergency Services (DES).

ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS

The EMC manages all matters pertaining to Disaster Preparedness, Emergency Management, and Recovery Assistance and administrative coordination with and support for all county emergency services departments and agencies in Fluvanna County. The essential functions of the position include, but are not limited to:

Emergency Management Oversight

- 1. Develop, update, and coordinate comprehensive emergency management plans and operations for Fluvanna County to mitigate, prepare for, respond to, and recover from the effects of any and all natural or manmade hazards.
- 2. Coordinate emergency management plans, procedures, and resources with all County departments, and other local, regional, state, and federal response agencies.
- 3. Coordinate activities and working relationships of service agencies within the County: Sheriff, Fire Departments, Rescue Services, Water Rescue Services, health care activities, Schools, Social Service agencies, County Public Works, the Red Cross, and others to assure their cooperation in an effective disaster relief system.
- 4. In consultation with the Director of Emergency Services (DES), activate and staff the County's Emergency Operations Center.
- 5. Disseminate warnings and notifications of disaster alerts and advise County staff and residents on emergency plans.
- 6. Coordinate emergency preparedness activities, training programs, and exercises to include workshops, drills, tabletop, functional, and/or full scale exercises to prepare residents, first responders, and staff to respond quickly and effectively in emergencies.
- 7. Develop and manage the emergency management budget; oversees and coordinates documentation of expense and reimbursement activities during the recovery phase of any emergency.
- 8. Prepare and make presentations and conduct other outreach activities for citizens and community groups regarding prevention, identification, and preparedness in emergency situations; participates in other public relations activities in support of the emergency preparedness program.
- 9. Prepare and disseminate educational materials and programs to assist residents in preparing for emergencies both in the home and at work; promotes emergency safety programs.
- 10. Prepare reports for the County Administrator, the Board of Supervisors, and the Local Emergency Planning Committee pertaining to emergency services and emergency management activities.

- 11. Work with the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) to manage environmental issues relative to identifying hazards; developing and approving remedial plans; hazardous waste handling and disposal; coordinates issues with other County staff.
- 12. Develop emergency management plans/strategies for special events organized by the County, in consultation with County emergency service providers.
- 13. Recruit, train, manage, and direct volunteers to assist the County during emergency situations.
- 14. Maintain public awareness; meets with news media for interviews and prepares press releases.
- 15. Serve as chairperson for the Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC).

Emergency Services Support

- 16. Assist fire/rescue operations/services in developing policies/procedures for compliance with federal, state, and county laws, rules, regulations and ordinances.
- 17. Periodically attends volunteer department meetings and activities to foster positive engagement with the volunteers and their organizations.
- 18. Direct budget planning, implementation and monitoring of the department, and makes recommendations to the County Administrator regarding appropriations to the fire, rescue, and water rescue companies and units.
- 19. Coordinate on emergency services purchasing activities and perform grant writing, management, and reporting duties.
- 20. Collaborate with emergency communication personnel on protocols and in procuring and maintaining systems and equipment.
- 21. Collaborate with county emergency service providers (e.g., Fluvanna Fire, Fluvanna Rescue, and LMVFD&RS, Inc.) to coordinate resources, review and modify response patterns, and help ensure effective and efficient use of resources.
- 22. Oversee EMS services contract and continually reviews alternatives and options, including volunteer expansion, transition to paid staffing augmentation, and contract EMS support.
- 23. Coordinate collection and review of emergency service response and staffing data on an on-going basis; analyze data to identify needs and to drive the decision-making process regarding staffing, response assignments, etc.
- 24. In concert with the Fire and Rescue Association, develops and maintains a strong county-wide volunteer recruitment and retention program and identifies and recommends incentives to help maintain a vibrant roster of fire and rescue volunteers for County agencies.

Other

- 25. Communicate with the County Administrator, Board of Supervisors, volunteer chiefs, and others, as appropriate, to keep them informed on all activities and works in cooperation with these individuals to manage the Department.
- 26. Work with the Virginia Department of Emergency Management to maintain plans, annual requirements for grant reporting, and attend required meetings, e.g., TEPW.
- 27. Plan for and attend meetings with staff, the County Administrator, the Board of Supervisors and special committees, including the Fire and Rescue Association.
- 28. Attend educational and training classes and seminars pertaining to Emergency Services and Emergency Management and convey information of interest to local agencies through formal and informal training programs and meetings.
- 29. Perform related duties as required.

REQUIRED KNOWLEDGE, SKILLS AND ABILITIES

Knowledge of:

• Emergency, environmental and fire hazard prevention; principles and practices of emergency management, including hazard identification, mitigation, disaster preparedness, response and recovery.

- Local, state and federal laws, and regulations regarding emergency services, disaster response, recovery and mitigation, i.e. the Virginia Department of Emergency Management Laws, i.e. 44-146.19
- Understanding of the County's responsibility to submit the Local Capability Assessment Report (LCAR) annually by June 30.
- Principles and practices of emergency and disaster preparedness, as well as modern fire fighting/fire prevention and/or emergency medical services.
- Incident Command System (ICS) and the National Incident Management System (NIMS); Emergency
 Operations Center (EOC) structure and operating procedures; emergency operations communications
 systems.
- Virginia Office of Emergency Medical System requirements and training techniques for development of emergency service personnel.
- Interrelationships, responsibilities, goals and functions of local, State and Federal government in planning, conducting and implementing emergency services.
- Logistics and operations planning techniques to coordinate and evaluate methods of service delivery of emergency personnel and materials.
- Management information systems (MIS) and computer applications.
- Governmental responsibilities, programs and response plans for hazardous materials spills and/or nuclear emergencies.

Skills in:

- Management with a focus toward positive change and results, along with a strong commitment to teamwork, goal orientation, and fiscal responsibility.
- Preparing and presenting public information, and public speaking.
- Techniques for analysis and assessment of the types and extent of damages caused by various types of disasters.
- Operation and use of common office equipment including personal computers and copiers.
- Coordination and monitoring of emergency personnel activities, equipment, and supplies.
- Preparation of comprehensive reports, correspondence, and plans involving detail, statistical and other data, or instructions.

Ability to:

- Work independently and take initiative, and to thrive in fast-paced, high-stress environments.
- Assess relative cost and benefits of potential actions.

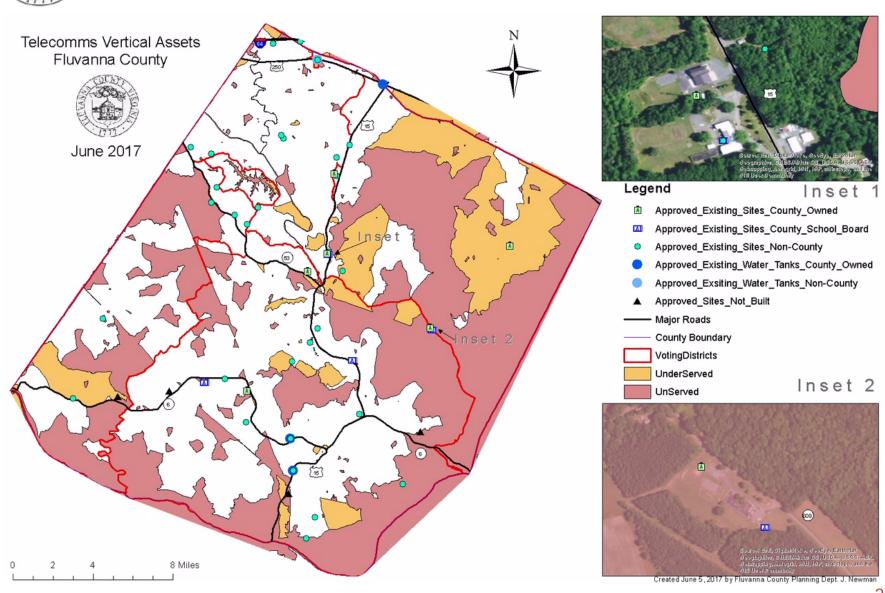


BAT Mission & Timeline

- The ultimate goal of the BAT and follow-on efforts is to collaborate with industry resources to develop a plan to expand affordable, reliable, and high capacity broadband internet access to all County businesses and residents.

Fluvanna County Broadband Issues

- 61% of Fluvanna residents responding to Center for Innovative Technology (CIT) demand identification survey said their internet service is inadequate
- 15% have NO internet service at all
- 19% of school-aged children have NO internet service at all at home. Adequate internet access is critical to virtually all modern education, and its lack is leaving Fluvanna children severely handicapped
- 76% of county business owners say their internet service is inadequate
- 33% of Fluvanna businesses have NO internet service at all. It's almost impossible to create a
 significant new business anywhere without good internet. And without new businesses there are
 few new jobs and few opportunities to increase Fluvanna tax revenue without increasing taxes. To
 a significant extent, the economic future of Fluvanna depends upon increasing the availability of
 affordable high-speed broadband services
- Most applications for jobs now are done online, and many more jobs are advertised online than in the newspaper. To get jobs, most Fluvanna residents need good internet
- Agricultural interests need access to internet for commodity data and for precision agriculture
- Good broadband gives residents access to tele-health services, shopping, DMV services, government information, etc.
- It's much more difficult to sell real estate that doesn't have broadband internet access, seriously depressing real estate prices in unserved and under-served areas of Fluvanna



Fluvanna County Decision Points



Step 1: Adopt and Prioritize Broadband Goals

- 1. Expand access and capacity
 - For residents that have no access or need other options.
 - To Public Safety facilities.
 - To businesses that have no access or need other options.
 - To Government facilities.
- 2. Promote computer literacy classes at libraries, YMCA, community and senior centers for the populations that may be slow to adopt technology or need special equipment.
- 3. Consider a computer refurb/donation program for households with affordability challenges.



Decision Points (cont.)

Step 2: Determine Desired Role of the County in Partnerships

Locality Investment Options to Offset Initial Cost

- Share county assets
- Space on existing towers
- Provide access to existing dark fiber
- New tower construction
- New fiber deployment
- Prepayment for Internet services

Recoupment Options

- Free or discounted internet services
- Rent (discounted?) for tower space or fiber usage

Decision Points (cont.)

Step 3: Specify what the County will Share/Invest

- Space on vertical assets existing towers, silos, water tanks, buildings etc.
- Share space for towers, network equipment or poles.
- Assist with project marketing and/or public relations leveraging County media relationships, direct mailings to constituents and social media.
- Leverage county relationships with local utilities, carrier-grade construction companies, and educational facilities etc., to help facilitate future deployments.
- Provide a single-point-of-contact for any permitting for broadband infrastructure construction by the private partner(s).
- Leverage ongoing or pending capital projects, such as water, road construction, main street revitalization, new sub-divisions, fiber builds etc.
- Provide possible assistance with deployment costs depending on available County funds.
- Pursue any federal or state broadband funding opportunities to help offset the costs of broadband access and capacity expansion.
- Provide anchor tenants to any private partner(s)' broadband networks to provide recurring revenue source. The service provided to county facilities must be equal or better than current pricing and quality of service that provides the required bandwidth to support those County functions.

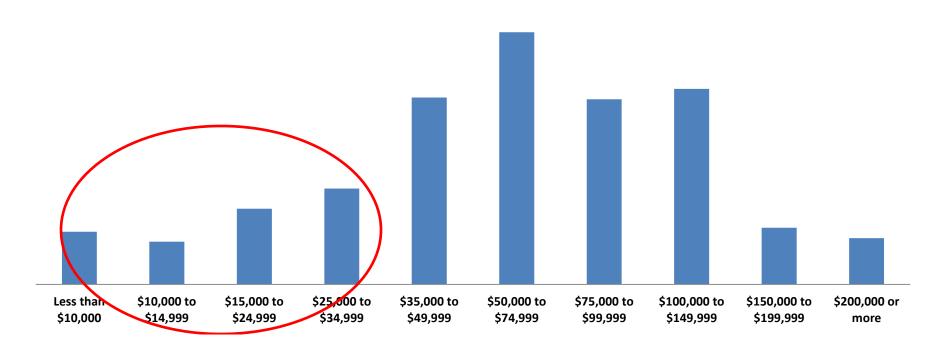

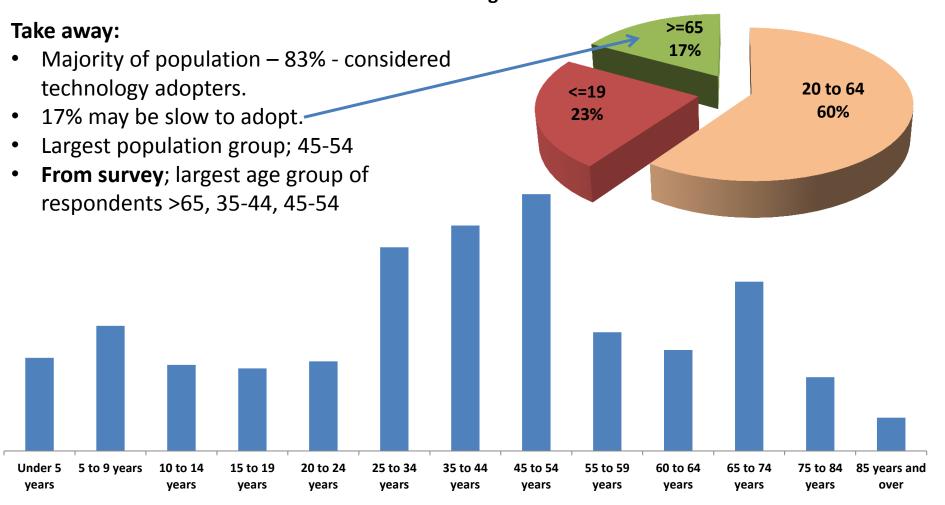

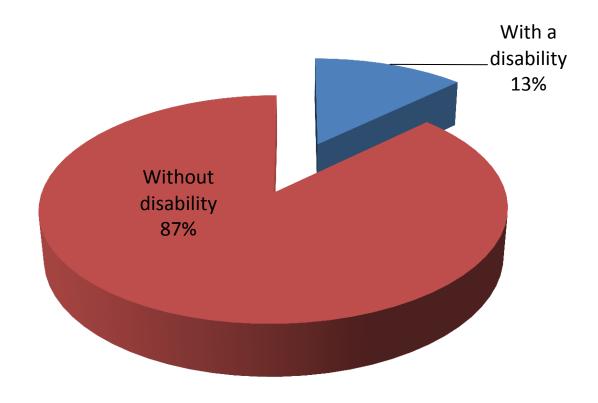

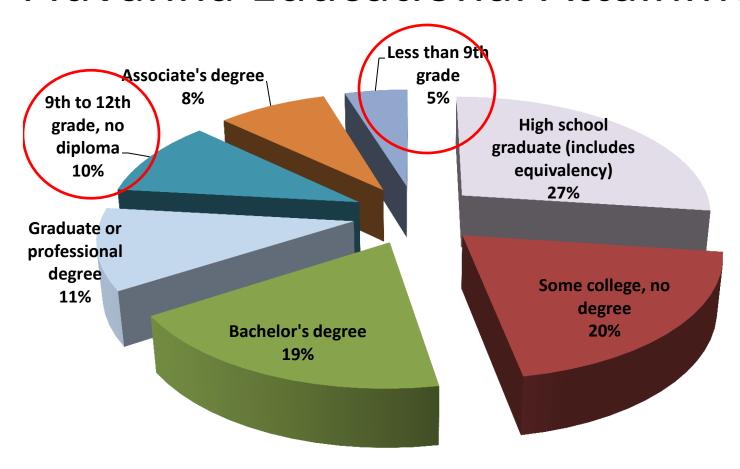


Fluvanna Population With Special Broadband Needs



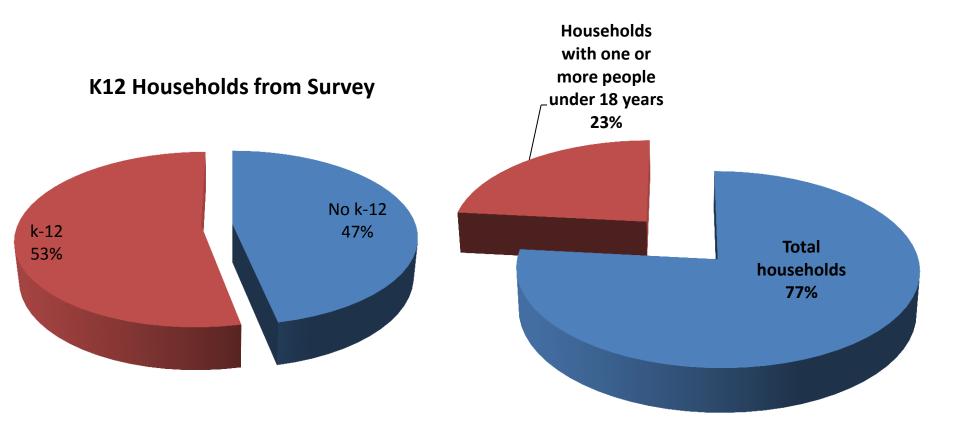

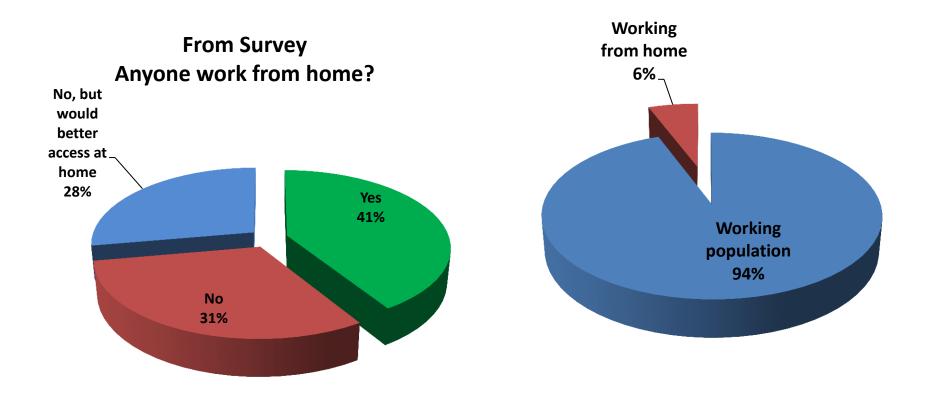

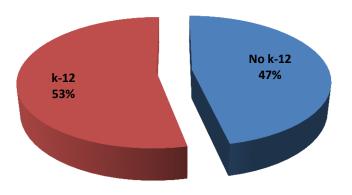

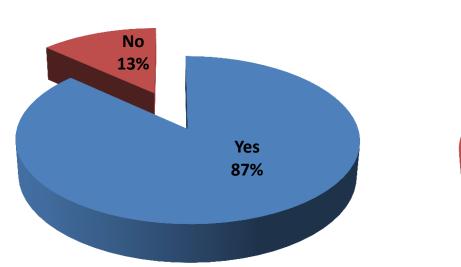

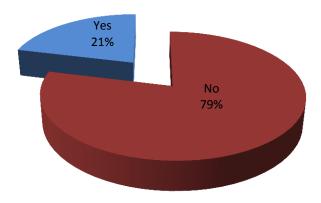

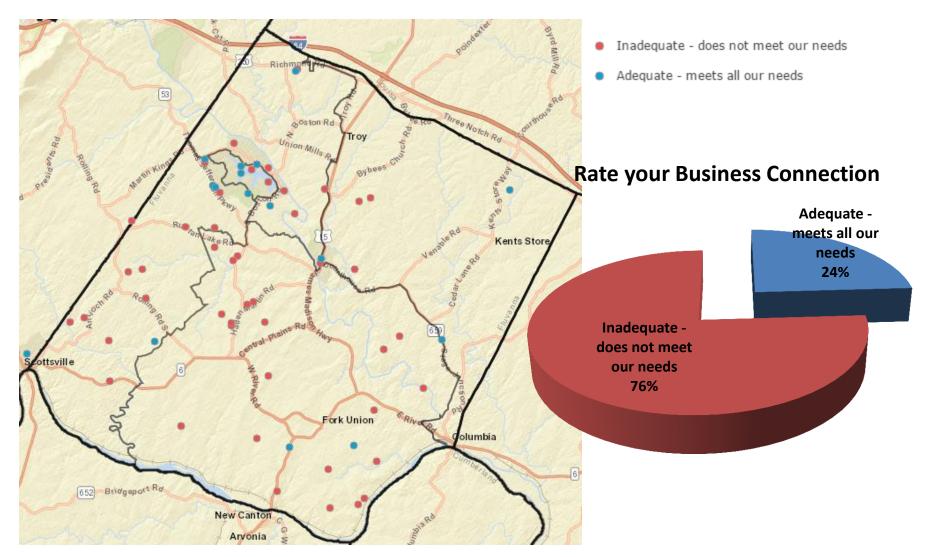

REVIEW OF LOCAL POLICIES & FEES

Make sure your policies and procedures are "Broadband Friendly"

Review comprehensive plans, community zoning regulations and process, policies, fees, etc. must encourage and enable broadband investment.

Review local franchise agreements for **setback or long-drop** policy. <u>Long-drop policy information should be conveyed to all new homebuilders, and real estate developers.</u>

<u>Adopt Dig Once:</u> Dig Once means less construction disruption, and costs for private providers—who may simply decide not to deploy in an area where the economics don't work.

The following three steps highlight the decisions Fluvanna County needs to make to stipulate their broadband goals, desired role in public private partnerships and how the County will facilitate partner expansions. Once the County completes the following three steps, please return this document to us (completed with number/checks) and CIT will combine these decisions and information from the assessment to prepare the County's broadband requirements included in a draft conceptual phase RFP. The draft RFP will be provided for the County to set target dates, complete contact information and ensure the RFP meets the County's procurement policy. CIT is happy to distribute the RFP once the County is ready to publish it.

Step 1: Adopt and Prioritize Broadband Goals

The needs listed below were identified from your community assessment. Select and prioritize those the County will adopt as goals moving forward with a broadband expansion plan. Feel free to add any other goals the County wants to include in this list. Please note priority by placing a number beside those needs you adopt as goals.

- **#1** Expand access and capacity for residents that have no access or need other options. According to the Fluvanna survey data:
 - 61% of respondents report their Internet service is inadequate
 - o 22% of those depend on inadequate and/or expensive services,
 - 15% have NO Internet access at all,
 - 19% of school aged children have no Internet at home,
 - 28% of respondents would work from home if they had better access
 - 53% of respondents report school-aged children, 10% of those are home schooled. 19% of K-12 students do not have Internet at home.
 - 30% of respondents would work from home if they could.

Specific residential priorities areas include, but not limited to:

- Fort Union voting district around East River Road region, Shiloh Road Region, Haden Martin Rd, Sclaters Ford Rd.
- Columbia voting district around Stage Junction Road, west of Venable Rd
- Cunningham voting district around West River Road, Beals Ln, Rolling Rd, Antioch Rd, Branch Road region, SW of Rt 53.
- o Palmyra voting district north of Lake Monticello Road, Broken Island Road area.
- Rivanna voting district: A number of residents around Lake Monticello report inadequate cable. Cable segments may be exhausted, may need fiber upgrades.
- **#2** Expand access and capacity to Public Safety facilities. Some public safety facilities are in designated underserved areas, specifically:
 - Kent Store Fire/Rescue is within an underserved area.
- **#3** Expand access and capacity to businesses that have no access or need other options. According to the Fluvanna survey data:

- o 76 % of business owners report their Internet service is inadequate
- o 21% (of all respondents) have home based businesses
- 33% of businesses have NO Internet access available

Specific priority areas include, but are not limited to:

- o Cunningham voting district: around Rolling Rd and Antioch Rd,
- Fort Union voting district: around Haden Martin Rd, Sclaters Ford Rd, and the Bremo Bluff area
- Rivanna voting district: A number of businesses around Lake Monticello report inadequate cable. Cable segments may be exhausted, may need fiber upgrades.

#4 Expand access and capacity to Government facilities. Some county facilities are in designated underserved areas, specifically:

Wastewater Plant

#5 Promote computer literacy classes at libraries, YMCA, community and senior centers for the populations that may be slow to adopt technology or need special equipment.

- 13% of population have a disability,
- 15% of population is educationally challenged,
- 17% of population are seniors

#6 Consider a computer refurb/donation program for households with affordability challenges.

- 17% of population are seniors,
- 21% of population have incomes <30K

Step 2: Determine the Desired Role of the County in Partnerships

Determine the role and partnership model that works best for Fluvanna County. Select one from the partnership models listed below (**Place a check mark beside desired role**):

■ Locality Shares Assets Only

Some localities do not have the resources (people or money) to bring to a partnership. However, all localities have assets (towers, land, rooftops). In these types of partnerships, the locality agrees to share assets and even provide the private partner some "anchor" tenants on their network – government facilities or fire/rescue stations that would buy service (or receive service in exchange for sharing assets) from the private partner's network. This ensures the private provider recurring revenue – or customers that will not go away (residential and small businesses can come and go). Sharing assets lowers the deployment cost (capital investment) of the private provider which expedites deployment and helps make the business case for the less populated areas.

□ Locality Covers Capital Investment

Some localities prefer to make all the capital investments – funding towers, head-end Internet service (the connection that provides the bandwidth to the network and connects to the world), and wireless equipment. The private partner brings their expertise to the table – design, deploy, maintain and operate the network. The private

partner would also provide the people resources to support end customers (setting up the connection, billing, etc.). In these models there is a revenue share and typically on a sliding scale – providing more of the revenue to the locality in the early years to reimburse them for the capital investment and then shifts to the private partner in the later years to offset their overhead expenses. The locality owns the network and contracts the private partner to run it.

✓ Locality Invests Some Capital

This model would be a blend of the previous two. The locality may share assets and may invest some capital to offset the initial costs of the network – maybe cover the costs of a new tower (or more) and/or some fiber deployment. The locality may arrange to recoup this investment by obtaining Internet services to county/city facilities, leasing space on the tower/fiber to other entities (ensuring there is no interference). The locality may purchase Internet service from the network and pay for years in advance – providing the private partner additional capital to help offset their initial investment. The private partner would fund the wireless equipment, customer premise equipment and all costs to deploy, maintain and operate the network. There would be no revenue sharing.

Step 3: Specify What the County will Share/Invest

Anything Fluvanna County can offer a potential provider(s) in the form of incentives, such as rights-of-way, pole attachments, easements, permits, or facilities can shorten future deployment time and make a project more attractive to potential providers.

The following County assets as identified in the assessment should be considered for commitment to any future broadband partnership. Please place a check mark beside the items the County is willing to commit to partners.

- ✓ Space on vertical assets existing towers, silos, water tanks, buildings etc.

- ✓ Assist with project marketing and/or public relations leveraging County media relationships, direct mailings to constituents and social media.
- ✓ Leverage county relationships with local utilities, carrier-grade construction companies, and educational facilities etc., to help facilitate future deployments.
 - o Fluvanna is in the CVEC/SCS broadband buildout footprint.
- ✓ Provide a single-point-of-contact for any permitting for broadband infrastructure construction by the private partner(s).
- ✓ Leverage ongoing or pending capital projects, such as water, road construction, main street revitalization, new sub-divisions, fiber builds etc.
 - County Water project (underway now)
 - School fiber build pending
 - There are 5 commercial tower sites approved but not yet built;
- ✓ Provide possible assistance with deployment costs depending on available County funds.

Proposed Sale of County Real Property Formerly Known as the Columbia Elementary School—Eric Dahl, Deputy County Administrator & Finance Director appeared before the Board to present a request to approve the sale of the former Columbia Elementary School.

Mr. Dahl presented the timeline of events:

- November 2013 Fluvanna County School Board declared by resolution, the Columbia and Cunningham Elementary School to be surplus property
 - Management of the school property was taken over by Fluvanna County
- December 2014 Formal Acceptance of the Columbia and Cunningham Elementary School by Fluvanna County
- March 2015 Utilized a cooperative state contract for Commercial Real Estate Services
 - o Only one firm met with County
 - o Did not want to take on the sales effort (difficult properties to market/sell)
- April 2015 Issued 1st Request for Proposals
 - o Ads in Richmond Times, Washington Post, and Roanoke Times
 - Posted on commercial real estate listing websites
 - Open House for Potential Proposers
 - No attendees at either property
 - o Proposals due June 12, 2015
 - Received no proposals
- June 2015 Issued RFP for Commercial Real Estate Brokerage Services
 - o One local Real Estate firm came to a non-mandatory pre-bid meeting
 - One auction house firm inquired
 - o Received no proposals
- September 2015 Issued 2nd Open-Ended Request for Proposals
 - Posted on commercial real estate listing websites
 - o nstalled for sale signs out in front of both buildings
 - o Between September 2015 and May 2017, received "2" proposals < \$35,000
- June 2017 Issued Addendum for Request for Proposals from September 2015
 - Posted a suggested MINIMUM PRICE
 - o Open House for Potential Proposers at the end of June
 - Over a dozen interested attendees at both properties

Furthermore, the Board of Supervisors authorizes the County Administrator to execute the Contract, Survey or Plat and any customary closing documents contingent upon the same being approved as to form by the County Attorney. ZMP 17:03 Columbia Rezoning—Brad Robinson, Senior Planner, brought forward a request to amend the Fluvanna County Zoning Map in order to establish county zoning districts on all parcels within the limits of the former town of Columbia. Mr. Robinson reported that at a Neighborhood Meeting held October 3, three (3) attendees asked general questions about the proposed zoning, permitted uses, and requirements for lot sizes and setbacks. Additionally, at the October 10, 2017 meeting, the Planning Commission recommended approval. Changes to the Zoning Map include:

Parcels south of Route 6 in floodplain to be zoned A-1 (Agricultural, General);

- Parcels south of Route 6 containing existing industrial business to be zoned I-2 (Industrial, General);
- Parcels along the north side of Route 6 to be zoned BC (Business Convenience);
- Parcels north of Route 6 to be zoned R-4 (Residential, Limited)

Mr. Robinson brought attention to two parcels, TMP 54A-1-65 & 54A-1-66 – these two parcels are bisected by State Route 6. The owner of parcel 54A-1-66 has requested that the portion south of State Route 6 be zoned A-1 to match the zoning of the adjacent parcel TMP 54A-1-82. Mr. Robinson notes that the portions of TMP 545A-1-66 and TMP 54A-1-65 that lie south of State Route 6 appear to be too small for any development, regardless of zoning.

There being no questions from the Board, Chair Sheridan opened the Public Hearing at 8:17pm.

- R.T. Harry, spoke with regard to the proposed amendments to the zoning map, specifically the split-zoning of TMP 54A-1-65 & TMP 54A-1-66.

ZMP 17:02 Village Oaks Proffer Amendment—Brad Robinson, Senior Planner, brought forward a request to amend proffer number eight (8) of ZMP 04:02 with respect to Tax Map 9, Section A, Parcels 13 and 14C and Tax Map 9, Section 13, Parcels A, B, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 & 7. The properties are located along the north side of Lake Monticello Road (Route 618), across from the main gate at Lake Monticello and Crofton Plaza. Proffer #8 states: "The residential development shall be restricted (in ownership, rental, lease, etc.) to individuals of age 55 and above. This shall be recorded as a covenant and restriction for the community." The proposed amendment removes the restriction regarding the age of the individuals owning or leasing in Village Oaks. Low interest in 55+ community living has spurred the developer to request this change.

Charlie Armstrong, Southern Development, addressed the proposal, and spoke to the Board regarding the changing vision for Village Oaks, as indicated by this request to amend Proffer #8. CONTRACT FOR OPEN SPACE LAND USE ASSESSMENT

THIS AGREEMENT, made this 14th day of October, 2017, by and between Mason L. & Nora J. Byrd party(ies) of the first part, hereinafter called the Grantor, and the COUNTY OF FLUVANNA, a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia, party of the second part, hereinafter called the County:

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the Grantor owns certain real estate, described below, hereinafter called the Property; and

WHEREAS, the County is the local governing body having real estate tax jurisdiction over the Property; and

WHEREAS, the County has determined:

- A. That it is in the public interest that the Property should be provided or preserved for conservation of agricultural and forestal land and of wildlife and
- B. That the property meets the applicable criteria for real estate devoted to open-space use as prescribed in Article 4 (Section 58.1-3229 et. seq.) of Chapter 32 of Title 58.1 of the Code of Virginia, and the standards for classifying such real estate prescribed by the Director of the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation; and
- C. That the provisions of this agreement meet the requirements and standards prescribed under section 58.1-3233 of the Code of Virginia for recorded commitments by landowners not to change an open-space use to a non-qualifying use; and

WHEREAS, the Grantor is willing to make a written recorded commitment to preserve and protect the open-space uses of the Property during the term of this agreement in order for the Property to be taxed on the basis of a use assessment, and the Grantor has submitted an application for such taxation to the Commissioner of the Revenue of the County pursuant to Section 58.1-3234 of the Code of Virginia and Section 20-4-2(d) of the Fluvanna County Code; and

WHEREAS, the County is willing to extend the tax for the Property on the basis of a use assessment commencing with the next succeeding tax year and continuing for the term of this agreement, in consideration of the Grantor's commitment to preserve and protect the open-space uses of the property, and on the condition that the Grantor's application is satisfactory and that all other requirements of Article 4, Chapter 32, Title 58.1 of the Code of Virginia and Section 20-4-2(d) of the Fluvanna County Code are complied with.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the recital and the mutual benefits, covenants and terms herein contained, the parties hereby **COVENANT** and **AGREE** as follows:

1. This agreement shall apply to all the following described real estate:

Tax Map Parcel: 31-A-1 (42.23 acres)

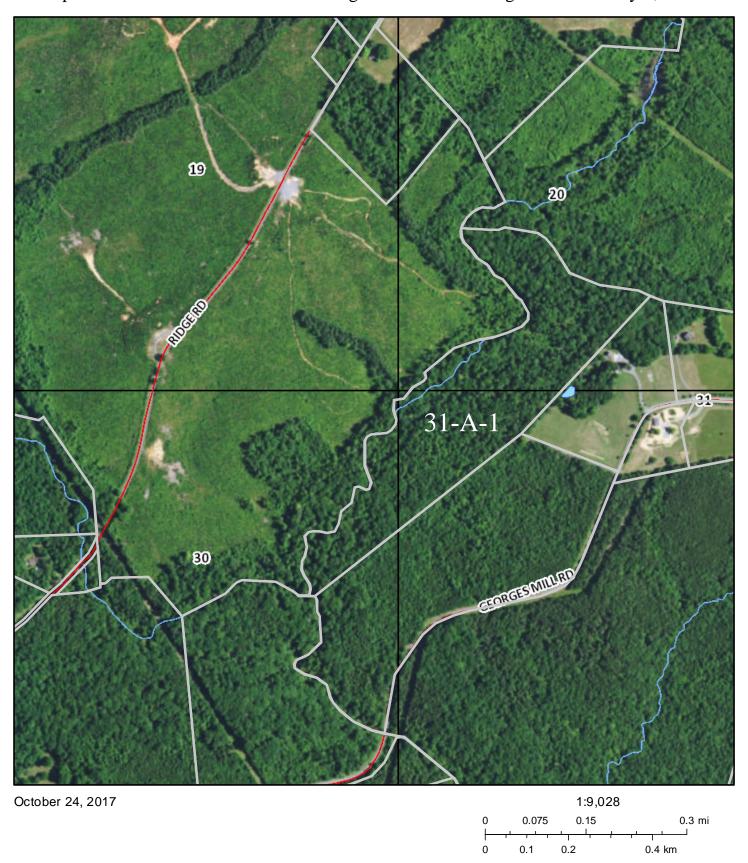
- 2. The Grantor agrees that during the term of this agreement:
 - A. There shall be no change in the use or uses of the Property that exist as of the date of this agreement to any use that would not qualify as open-space use. The qualifying use for the Property is conservation of agricultural and forestal land and of wildlife.
 - B. There shall be no display of billboards, signs or other advertisements on the property except to (i) state solely the name of the Grantor and the address of the Property, (ii) advertise the sale or lease of the Property, (iii) advertise the sale of goods or services produced pursuant to the permitted use of the Property, or (iv) provide warnings. No sign shall exceed four feet by four feet.
 - C. There shall be no construction, placement or maintenance of any structure on the Property unless such structure is either:
 - 1) on the Property as of the date of this agreement; or
 - 2) related to and compatible with the open-space uses of the Property which this agreement is intended to protect or provide for.
 - D. There shall be no dumping or storage of trash, garbage, ashes, waste, junk, abandoned property or other unsightly or offensive material on the Property.
 - E. There shall be no filling, excavating, mining, drilling, removal of topsoil, sand, gravel, rock, minerals, or other materials which alters the topography of the Property, except as required in the construction of permissible building structures and features under this agreement.

- F. There shall be no construction or placement of fences, screens, hedges, walls or other similar barriers which materially obstruct the public view of scenic areas of the Property.
- G. The Grantor may engage in agricultural, horticultural or silvicultural activities and remove vegetation which constitutes a safety, a health or an ecological hazard, e.g., vegetation classified as noxious weed pursuant the Code of Virginia (1950), as amended.
- H. There shall be no alteration or manipulation of natural water courses, shores, marshes, swamps, wetlands or other water bodies, nor any activities or uses which adversely affect water quality, level or flow.
- I. On areas of the Property that are being provided or preserved for conservation of land, floodways or other natural resources, or that are to be left in a relatively natural or undeveloped state, there shall be no operation of dune buggies, all-terrain vehicles, motorcycles, motorbikes, snowmobiles or other motor vehicles, except to the extent necessary to inspect, protect or preserve the area.
- J. There shall be no industrial or commercial activities, conducted on the property, except for the continuation of agricultural, horticultural or silvicultural activities; or activities that are conducted in a residence or an associated outbuilding such as garage, smokehouse, small shop or similar structure which is permitted on the property.
- K. There shall be no separation or split-off of lots, pieces or parcels from the property. The Property may be sold or transferred during the term of this agreement only as the same entire parcel that is the subject to this agreement, provided, however, that the Grantor may grant to a public body or bodies open-space, conservation or historic preservation easements which apply to all or part of the Property.
- 3. This agreement shall be effective upon acceptance by the County, provided, however, that the real estate tax for the Property shall not be extended on the basis of its use value until the next succeeding tax year following timely application by the Grantor for the use assessment and taxation in accordance with Section 20-4-2(d) of the Fluvanna County Code. Thereafter, this agreement shall remain in effect for a terms of fifteen (15) consecutive years.

- 4. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as giving to the public a right to enter upon or to use the Property or any portion thereof, except as the Grantor may otherwise allow, consistent with the provisions of this agreement.
- 5. The County shall have the right at all reasonable times to enter the Property to determine whether the Grantor is complying with the provisions of this agreement.
- 6. Nothing in this agreement shall be construed to create in the public or member thereof a right to maintain a suit for any damages against the Grantor for any violation of this agreement.
- 7. Nothing in this agreement shall be construed to permit Grantor to conduct any activity or to build or maintain any improvement which is otherwise prohibited by law.
- 8. If any provision of this agreement is determined to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of the agreement shall not be affected thereby.
- 9. The provisions of this agreement shall run with the land and be binding upon the parties, their successors, assigns, personal representatives, and heirs.
- 10. Words of one gender used herein shall include the other gender, and words in the singular shall include words in the plural, whenever the sense requires.
- 11. This agreement may be terminated in the manner provided in Section 15.1-1513 of the Code of Virginia for withdrawal of land from an agricultural, forestal or an agricultural and forestal district.
- 12. Upon termination of this agreement, the Property shall thereafter be assessed and taxed at its fair market value, regardless of its actual use, unless the County determines otherwise in accordance with applicable law.
- 13. NOTICE: WHEN THE OPEN SPACE USE OR USES BY WHICH THE PROPERTY QUALIFIED FOR ASSESSMENT AND TAXATION ON THE BASIS OF USE CHANGES TO A NONQUALIFING USE OR USES, OR WHEN THE ZONING FOR THE PROPERTY CHANGES TO A MORE INTENSIVE USE AT THE REQUEST OF THE GRANTOR, THE PROPERTY, OR SUCH PORTION OF THE PROPERTY WHICH NO LONGER QUALIFIES SHALL BE SUBJECT TO ROLLBACK TAXES IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 58.1-3237 OF THE CODE OF VIRGINIA. THE GRANTOR SHALL BE SUBJECT TO ALL OF THE OBLIGATIONS AND LIABILITIES OF SAID CODES SECTION.
