







# Make sure your policies and procedures are "Broadband Friendly"

**Review** comprehensive plans, community zoning regulations and process, policies, fees, etc. must **encourage and enable broadband investment**.

**Review** local franchise agreements for **setback or long-drop** policy. <u>Long-drop policy information</u> <u>should be conveyed to all new homebuilders, and real estate developers.</u>

<u>Adopt Dig Once:</u> Dig Once means less construction disruption, and costs for private providers—who may simply decide not to deploy in an area where the economics don't work.

The draft RFP will be provided for the County to set target dates, complete contact information and ensure the RFP meets the County's procurement policy. CIT is happy to distribute the RFP once the County is ready to publish it.

#### **Step 1: Adopt and Prioritize Broadband Goals**

The needs listed below were identified from your community assessment. Select and prioritize those the County will adopt as goals moving forward with a broadband expansion plan. Feel free to add any other goals the County wants to include in this list. Please note priority by placing a number beside those needs you adopt as goals.

**#1** Expand access and capacity for residents that have no access or need other options. According to the Fluvanna survey data:

- 61% of respondents report their Internet service is inadequate
- o 22% of those depend on inadequate and/or expensive services,
- 15% have NO Internet access at all,
- 19% of school aged children have no Internet at home,
- 28% of respondents would work from home if they had better access
- 53% of respondents report school-aged children, 10% of those are home schooled. 19% of K-12 students do not have Internet at home.
- 30% of respondents would work from home if they could.

Specific residential priorities areas include, but not limited to:

- Fort Union voting district around East River Road region, Shiloh Road Region, Haden Martin Rd, Sclaters Ford Rd.
- Columbia voting district around Stage Junction Road, west of Venable Rd
- Cunningham voting district around West River Road, Beals Ln, Rolling Rd, Antioch Rd, Branch Road region, SW of Rt 53.
- o Palmyra voting district north of Lake Monticello Road, Broken Island Road area.
- Rivanna voting district: A number of residents around Lake Monticello report inadequate cable. Cable segments may be exhausted, may need fiber upgrades.
- **#2** Expand access and capacity to Public Safety facilities. Some public safety facilities are in designated underserved areas, specifically:
  - Kent Store Fire/Rescue is within an underserved area.
- **#3** Expand access and capacity to businesses that have no access or need other options. According to the Fluvanna survey data:

- o 76 % of business owners report their Internet service is inadequate
- o 21% (of all respondents) have home based businesses
- 33% of businesses have NO Internet access available

Specific priority areas include, but are not limited to:

- o Cunningham voting district: around Rolling Rd and Antioch Rd,
- Fort Union voting district: around Haden Martin Rd, Sclaters Ford Rd, and the Bremo Bluff area.
- Rivanna voting district: A number of businesses around Lake Monticello report inadequate cable. Cable segments may be exhausted, may need fiber upgrades.

**#4** Expand access and capacity to Government facilities. Some county facilities are in designated underserved areas, specifically:

#### **Step 2: Determine the Desired Role of the County in Partnerships**

Determine the role and partnership model that works best for Fluvanna County. Select one from the partnership models listed below (**Place a check mark beside desired role**):

#### □ Locality Shares Assets Only

Some localities do not have the resources (people or money) to bring to a partnership. However, all localities have assets (towers, land, rooftops). In these types of partnerships, the locality agrees to share assets and even provide the private partner some "anchor" tenants on their network – government facilities or fire/rescue stations that would buy service (or receive service in exchange for sharing assets) from the private partner's network. This ensures the private provider recurring revenue – or customers that will not go away (residential and small businesses can come and go). Sharing assets lowers the deployment cost (capital investment) of the private provider which expedites deployment and helps make the business case for the less populated areas.

#### ■ Locality Covers Capital Investment

Some localities prefer to make all the capital investments – funding towers, head-end Internet service (the connection that provides the bandwidth to the network and connects to the world), and wireless equipment. The private partner brings their expertise to the table – design, deploy, maintain and operate the network. The private

partner would also provide the people resources to support end customers (setting up the connection, billing, etc.). In these models there is a revenue share and typically on a sliding scale – providing more of the revenue to the locality in the early years to reimburse them for the capital investment and then shifts to the private partner in the later years to offset their overhead expenses. The locality owns the network and contracts the private partner to run it.

#### ✓ Locality Invests Some Capital

This model would be a blend of the previous two. The locality may share assets and may invest some capital to offset the initial costs of the network – maybe cover the costs of a new tower (or more) and/or some fiber deployment. The locality may arrange to recoup this investment by obtaining Internet services to county/city facilities, leasing space on the tower/fiber to other entities (ensuring there is no interference). The locality may purchase Internet service from the network and pay for years in advance – providing the private partner additional capital to help offset their initial investment. The private partner would fund the wireless equipment, customer premise equipment and all costs to deploy, maintain and operate the network. There would be no revenue sharing.

#### **Step 3: Specify What the County will Share/Invest**

Anything Fluvanna County can offer a potential provider(s) in the form of incentives, such as rights-of-way, pole attachments, easements, permits, or facilities can shorten future deployment time and make a project more attractive to potential providers.

The following County assets as identified in the assessment should be considered for commitment to any future broadband partnership. Please place a check mark beside the items the County is willing to commit to partners.

- ✓ Space on vertical assets existing towers, silos, water tanks, buildings etc.



- ✓ Assist with project marketing and/or public relations leveraging County media relationships, direct mailings to constituents and social media.
- ✓ Leverage county relationships with local utilities, carrier-grade construction companies, and educational facilities etc., to help facilitate future deployments.
  - o Fluvanna is in the CVEC/SCS broadband buildout footprint.
- ✓ Provide a single-point-of-contact for any permitting for broadband infrastructure construction by the private partner(s).
- ✓ Leverage ongoing or pending capital projects, such as water, road construction, main street revitalization, new sub-divisions, fiber builds etc.
  - County Water project (underway now)
  - School fiber build pending
  - There are 5 commercial tower sites approved but not yet built;
- ✓ Provide possible assistance with deployment costs depending on available County funds.
- ✓ Pursue any federal or state broadband funding opportunities to help offset the costs of broadband access and capacity expansion.










**Reports To:** County Administrator

#### **SUMMARY**

The Emergency Management Coordinator (EMC) serves as Head of the County's Office of Emergency Management (OEM). The EMC is responsible for planning, training, response, resource coordination, and other emergency services support activities, both within the county government and in coordination with other local and state agencies. The EMC works under the general day-to-day direction of the County Administrator, who serves as the County's Director of Emergency Services (DES).

#### **ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS**

The EMC manages all matters pertaining to Disaster Preparedness, Emergency Management, and Recovery Assistance and administrative coordination with and support for all county emergency services departments and agencies in Fluvanna County. The essential functions of the position include, but are not limited to:

#### **Emergency Management Oversight**

- 1. Develop, update, and coordinate comprehensive emergency management plans and operations for Fluvanna County to mitigate, prepare for, respond to, and recover from the effects of any and all natural or manmade hazards.
- 2. Coordinate emergency management plans, procedures, and resources with all County departments, and other local, regional, state, and federal response agencies.
- 3. Coordinate activities and working relationships of service agencies within the County: Sheriff, Fire Departments, Rescue Services, Water Rescue Services, health care activities, Schools, Social Service agencies, County Public Works, the Red Cross, and others to assure their cooperation in an effective disaster relief system.
- 4. In consultation with the Director of Emergency Services (DES), activate and staff the County's Emergency Operations Center.
- 5. Disseminate warnings and notifications of disaster alerts and advise County staff and residents on emergency plans.
- 6. Coordinate emergency preparedness activities, training programs, and exercises to include workshops, drills, tabletop, functional, and/or full scale exercises to prepare residents, first responders, and staff to respond quickly and effectively in emergencies.
- 7. Develop and manage the emergency management budget; oversees and coordinates documentation of expense and reimbursement activities during the recovery phase of any emergency.
- 8. Prepare and make presentations and conduct other outreach activities for citizens and community groups regarding prevention, identification, and preparedness in emergency situations; participates in other public relations activities in support of the emergency preparedness program.
- 9. Prepare and disseminate educational materials and programs to assist residents in preparing for emergencies both in the home and at work; promotes emergency safety programs.
- 10. Prepare reports for the County Administrator, the Board of Supervisors, and the Local Emergency Planning Committee pertaining to emergency services and emergency management activities.

- 11. Work with the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) to manage environmental issues relative to identifying hazards; developing and approving remedial plans; hazardous waste handling and disposal; coordinates issues with other County staff.
- 12. Develop emergency management plans/strategies for special events organized by the County, in consultation with County emergency service providers.
- 13. Recruit, train, manage, and direct volunteers to assist the County during emergency situations.
- 14. Maintain public awareness; meets with news media for interviews and prepares press releases.
- 15. Serve as chairperson for the Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC).

#### **Emergency Services Support**

- 16. Assist fire/rescue operations/services in developing policies/procedures for compliance with federal, state, and county laws, rules, regulations and ordinances.
- 17. Periodically attends volunteer department meetings and activities to foster positive engagement with the volunteers and their organizations.
- 18. Direct budget planning, implementation and monitoring of the department, and makes recommendations to the County Administrator regarding appropriations to the fire, rescue, and water rescue companies and units.
- 19. Coordinate on emergency services purchasing activities and perform grant writing, management, and reporting duties.
- 20. Collaborate with emergency communication personnel on protocols and in procuring and maintaining systems and equipment.
- 21. Collaborate with county emergency service providers (e.g., Fluvanna Fire, Fluvanna Rescue, and LMVFD&RS, Inc.) to coordinate resources, review and modify response patterns, and help ensure effective and efficient use of resources.
- 22. Oversee EMS services contract and continually reviews alternatives and options, including volunteer expansion, transition to paid staffing augmentation, and contract EMS support.
- 23. Coordinate collection and review of emergency service response and staffing data on an on-going basis; analyze data to identify needs and to drive the decision-making process regarding staffing, response assignments, etc.
- 24. In concert with the Fire and Rescue Association, develops and maintains a strong county-wide volunteer recruitment and retention program and identifies and recommends incentives to help maintain a vibrant roster of fire and rescue volunteers for County agencies.

#### **Other**

- 25. Communicate with the County Administrator, Board of Supervisors, volunteer chiefs, and others, as appropriate, to keep them informed on all activities and works in cooperation with these individuals to manage the Department.
- 26. Work with the Virginia Department of Emergency Management to maintain plans, annual requirements for grant reporting, and attend required meetings, e.g., TEPW.
- 27. Plan for and attend meetings with staff, the County Administrator, the Board of Supervisors and special committees, including the Fire and Rescue Association.
- 28. Attend educational and training classes and seminars pertaining to Emergency Services and Emergency Management and convey information of interest to local agencies through formal and informal training programs and meetings.
- 29. Perform related duties as required.

• Emergency, environmental and fire hazard prevention; principles and practices of emergency management, including hazard identification, mitigation, disaster preparedness, response and recovery.


