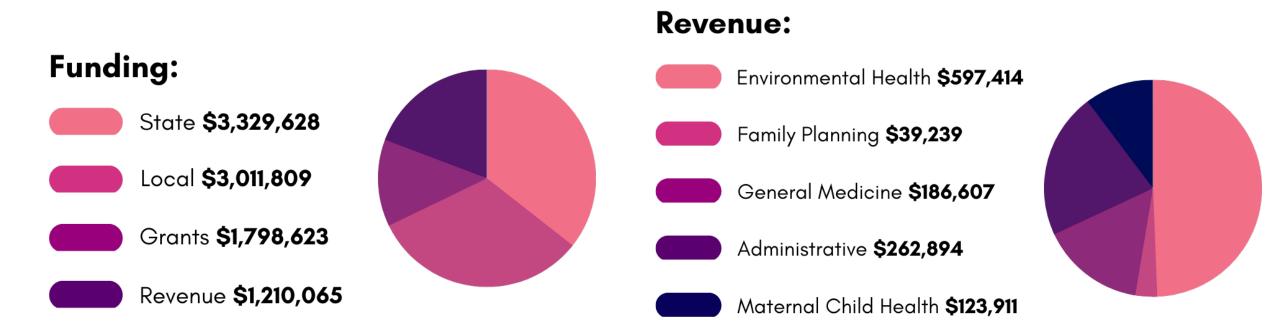

FY24 Budget Request

 Funding will support two clinical staffing to increase access to health services in Fluvanna County:

Office Support Specialist Public Health Nurse

- Funding also supports a portion of a Public Health Nurse Supervisor
- 5% state employee salary increase effective July 10, 2023
- Health insurance premiums (projected 4% increase)

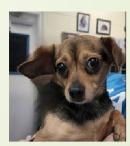

Critical Shelter Needs

- Chipped paint in kennels. Unhealthy environment and potential health hazard. State vet has issued a verbal warning.
- Painting ceilings. Excess moisture in building is causing mold and peeling paint on ceilings.
- •Aging building with limited space. Donations pile up in the hallways. Our managers office is in a closet. Cats have no where to socialize and are caged 24/7. Isolation room is extremely small.
- Installation of an updated ventilation system. The shelter has such a strong odor it is a turn off at the front door!
- Staff break room. In progress! This has already been well received and will help with morale and staff retention.

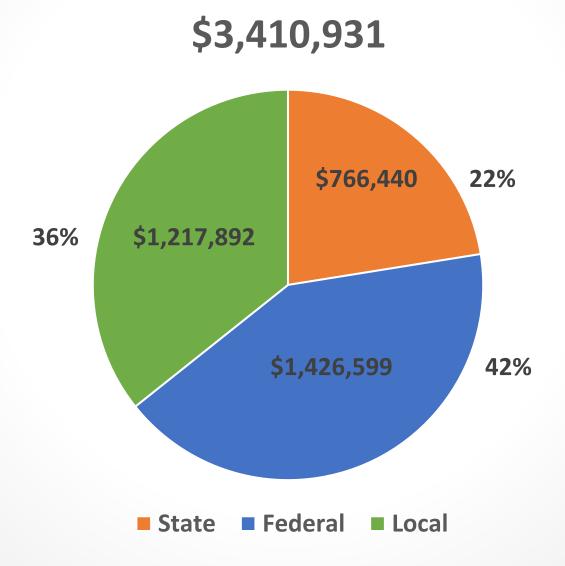

Public Assistance Economic Benefit to Locale

- \$43,253,748 annual Medical Assistance to 6,007 Fluvanna residents Average 57 new applications per month
- \$4,819,242 annual SNAP Benefits (Food Stamps)
 \$401,604 monthly assistance to 2,394 Fluvanna residents
 Average 56 new applications per month
- \$162,616 annual TANF (Temporary Aid to Needy Families) \$13,551 monthly assistance to 140 Fluvanna residents Average 8 new applications per month



Other Assistance Economic Benefit to Locale

- \$330,850 annual Child Care Assistance
 \$27,571 monthly assistance to 55 Fluvanna families

Child Protective Services

- Conducted 96 Investigations/Family Assessments
 Average 8 new inv/family assessments per month
- In-Home Services and Family Support Services
 Average 22 cases per month
- Conducted Outreaches
 Average 6 outreaches per month

Foster Care

Average 18 Children in Foster Care per month



Adult Protective Services and Adult Services

Staff Pay Increase

- **→ 5% state pay increase in FY23 was 58.3% state/federal funds and 41.7% local funds**
- → 5% FY24 increase = \$90,079
 \$52,516 state/federal funds
 \$37,563 local funds

Staff Pay Increase

- → Senate and House recommending 7% pay increase for state supported local employees
- → 7% FY24 increase = \$126,111 \$73,523 state/federal funds \$52,588 local funds

Alignment Increase

- **→ Two employees are under the** recommended salary by 44% and 23%
- → The cost to fund 10% increases for the two employees is \$16,652

\$5,329 state/federal (32%) **\$11,323** local (68%)

CIP request

One vehicle replacement \$70,000

Replace 2008 van with pickup truck
